



Color Terms

- English has *black, white, red, yellow, green, blue, brown, purple, pink, orange*, and *gray* (11 basic color terms). *Crimson, blonde, taupe* are not basic.

- **B-K Hypothesis**


Comparison of almost 100 languages: 2 to 11 universal color categories:

If a language contains only two basic color terms: they are always black and white. When a language has three basic color terms, the third one will be red.

(Brent and Kay 1969)

B-K Hypothesis (1969)

Berlin and Kay presented a theory of universal color categories and their sequential development.

cool

X < Y means:

if language contains y, it must also contain x

Only Cantonese, Vietnamese, Western Apache, Hopi, Samal and Papago didn't fit the hierarchy

B-K Hypothesis (1969)

- Black, white, red, yellow, green and blue seem to be fundamental colors. They are more predictable than *derived terms* (orange, purple, pink, brown and grey).
- Although there may be universal patterns in the development of systems of color-term classification, languages differ in **the symbolic meanings** embodied in color terms.

Colors in Culture

- Understanding a culture's metaphors helps us understand something about the culture itself. Some metaphors are universal and this universality of the metaphor may rest in the universal human physiology.
- English
 - *to feel blue* (feel sad)
 - *a blue moon*
 - *to be in the pink* (to be in the best condition)
- Figurative Language: COLOR IDIOMS

White in Chinese Context

- Meaning: Death, terror, failure
- 白包 / 白事 Funeral
- 舉白旗 To surrender
- 白費力氣 All in vain
- 白搭 Of no use
- 白丁 illiterate or commoner

Colors Metaphors

Black in English

Meaning: the color of mystery and the symbol of darkness

- **Black** future
- **Black** market goods
- **Black** Friday
- A **black** hole
- In a **black** mood
- A **black** look (angry look)

Black in Chinese


Meaning: associated with negative qualities, awful, evil and illegal

- 黑社會
- 黑心
- 黑幫
- 黑函
- 黑馬 (unexpected winner)
- 黑箱作業

Colors Metaphors

Red in English Context

- like a **red** rag to a bull.
- See **red**
- Be in the **red**
- A **red-letter** day
- Be caught **red-handed**
- **Red-light** district



Red in Chinese Context

- 紅顏
- 紅頂商人
- 紅光滿面 = the face is glowing with health
- 他很紅 = He is well-known and popular




